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THE SUPREMES AT EARL'S ALL-YOU-CAN-EAT follows lifelong best friends Odette (Aunjanue Ellis-Taylor), Barbara Jean (Sanaa Lathan), and Clarice (Uzo Aduba) known as "The Supremes", who share the unbreakable bonds of sisterhood from decades of weathering life's storms. Through the joys and sorrows of life, marriage and children, happiness and blues, love and loss, new shades of heartbreak and illness threaten to stir up the past when the trio sees their bond put to the test as they face their most challenging times yet.

Searchlight Pictures presents THE SUPREMES AT EARL'S ALL-YOU-CAN-EAT, starring Aunjanue Ellis-Taylor (King Richard, The Color Purple), Sanaa Lathan (Love & Basketball, The Best Man) and Uzo Aduba ("In Treatment," "Orange is the New Black"). The film is directed by Tina Mabry (Mississippi Damned, "Queen of the South", "Pose") from a screenplay co-written by Cee Marcellus and Tina Mabry, adapted from the novel by Edward Kelsey Moore. A FRIENDSHIP LOVE STORY

For director **Tina Mabry**, bringing the story of **THE SUPREMES AT EARL'S ALL-YOU-CAN-EAT** to life meant nurturing the beautiful story of sisterhood, life and the joy and trials that come with it. Adapted from the 2013 *New York Times* best-selling novel by **Edward Kelsey Moore**, she wanted to approach the film as a love story between three friends. "It's about the family that we choose, not necessarily the one that we're born with – the sole family that you create," she explains. "And how do you, over the course of three decades, keep a friendship together when life is throwing you every possible obstacle it can?"

When pitching the story, Mabry couldn't help but think about not only her mother, her aunts, her friends, but also herself. She says, "After I went into the pitch meeting, I cried at the end of it, because it is really a story that I am in love with."

Being in love with the story and bringing it to life aren't the same thing. And when it comes to a story about women – especially black women – movies haven't always been as truthful as they should be. "These are characters who are not just 'types,'" Mabry emphasizes. "They are people, and I wanted to make sure they would be fully embodied. Getting on this project, I was able to really put in my voice to make sure that we're looking at this story through a lens we often don't get to see."

Oscar® nominee **Aunjanue Ellis-Taylor**, who plays Odette, says, "My first impression of the script was that this is an opportunity for women to share space on screen, which doesn't happen very often, and certainly not with me. It is just a treasure. We underestimate women's friendships and they are so powerful."

Mabry ultimately found the soul of the story by looking inward. She reflected upon her own relationship with her two lifelong best friends from USC film school. "I realized that over the 20 years we've known each other, there's always been that sisterhood. These are the women that I would die for," she confesses. "That friendship was something I really wanted to integrate into *The Supremes*. I wanted to make sure that heartbeat stayed, no matter what life threw at them, whether it was when they were 17 or when they near 50 years old. That's the thing that has sustained my sisterhood with my own Supremes."

THE SUPREMES AT EARL'S ALL-YOU-CAN-EAT transcends socioeconomics, race, gender, and sexual orientation. "It is a very human story that shows how we all deal with relationships." Mabry continues, "I realized when looking at these characters, whether it's Odette who has a savior complex; or someone like Clarice, who is stuck in a box and has been completely morphed into fitting into an image; or Barbara Jean, who is a broken woman trying to find hope, but at the same time, not feeling that she deserves it – each of these women are going through all these things, and what they don't say weighs on them."

With the love and support of their sisterhood, each undergoes their own journey of self-discovery. "It's a beautiful tale of friends that become family and all of the obstacles and joys and triumphs and tragedies of life that we all go through as human beings," adds **Sanaa Lathan**, who plays Barbara Jean. "This threesome of strong, Black women come together to hold each other up through it all and witness each other."

Multiple-Emmy®-winner **Uzo Aduba**, who plays Clarice, agrees, adding that "the story of The Supremes captures the different stages and phases of friendship—sisterhood, the hard times, the great

times. You get to see them walk through the better and the worst and watch what it takes to keep a bond together."

Author and creator Kelsey Moore adds, "I want people to come away from this with a feeling of a broader community and that friendship has power and love has power."

"I think what's really going to connect the audience is the honesty of it all," Mabry concludes. "It's pulling back the veneer, and at the same time, giving you that space and that latitude to laugh and, also, have a place to cry."

THE YOUNGER & OLDER SUPREMES

Finding women who could authentically embody The Supremes, both in their youth and as adults, as well as other members of the cast, was a significant challenge. "One of the major challenges came in trying to marry a younger character with their adult self because you always have to go through, 'physically, how do they look and is the audience going to buy that this is the mature, older version?'," shares Mabry. "But what was also just as important was that the adult actors, who we cast before the younger kids, understood their characters and who they really were at each stage."

To strike the right balance, Mabry paired the adult actors with their younger counterparts so they could cultivate a relationship and discuss their characters' journeys, to ensure the adult actors held onto the vibrancy and love of their younger characters and a seamless transition across the film's 30-year span, from 1968-1999. "I wanted to make sure that our adult actors had room to grow from their younger selves," says Mabry. She wanted to do that without the audience ever having a hesitation about who or where they are because they've fallen in love with them already.

Forming that bond was easy, recalls Ellis-Taylor. "We had a couple of really candid conversations about why these women are where they are in their lives right now. I bring a lot from what is going on in my own life to the screen, and Sanaa and Uzo have also both been incredibly transparent in sharing things that have informed the work that we're doing on screen. They are the best at what they do, and so that's where you start."

"It's been wonderful collaborating with Sanaa and Aunjanue," echoes Aduba. "They're both remarkable actresses who I love, I respect, and have an incredible time with. They have such invention when they create. You want somebody who knows how to swim when you go in the pool, and they definitely do."

The chemistry extended to their younger counterparts – Kyanna "KeeKee" Simone, Abigail "Abi" Achiri, and Tati Gabrielle, who respectively play Odette, Clarice, and Barbara Jean – also had easy chemistry.

"It was so perfect," raves Simone. "I loved working with Tati and Abigail. We had so much fun on and off screen. I feel like the second that all three of us met, we knew that we'd be lifelong friends. It's almost like we're The Supremes off camera just like Odette, Clarice, and Barbara Jean are The Supremes on camera."

Of course, playing the younger version of characters embodied by such titans was an honor. Simone is especially vocal about that and thought it was one of the most rewarding experiences to be playing the younger version of Ellis-Taylor's character. "How many times do you get to say that in your lifetime? She's so amazing," she gushes. "When I knew that I was auditioning to play a younger her, I did so much research. I just wanted to do Miss Aunjanue justice, and I really hope that I did."

Achiri concludes about the film, "Hopefully people can watch it and see that yes, you can have someone who you can trust and who has your back from beginning to end."

THE MEN

Another crucial element in *THE SUPREMES AT EARL'S ALL-YOU-CAN-EAT* is the men in their lives. **Mekhi Phifer** as James and Russell Hornsby as Richmond, transition from Odette and Clarice's boyfriends to husbands. Barbara Jean's love interest are played by **Julian McMahon** as Ray and **Vondie Curtis Hall** as Lester. Big Earl, the namesake of the diner, played by veteran actor **Tony Winters**, is one of the film's central figures.

Winters describes his character "as a selfless individual who serves his community not for notoriety, not for profit, not for reward, but just because that is his heart. And, so, he becomes a patriarchal figure, a protector, to these young girls."

Xavier Mills, who plays young Richmond and says he's found a mentor in Hornsby, agrees with Achiri about their connection. "What makes this relationship special is that you have two talented people, a pianist, and an athlete, two people who grew up in the church. They understand the pressure and expectations of being perfect," he explains.

"When you see Clarice and you see young Richmond, they're very stylish. They're very put together. I feel like they show Black success. I think their love shows what it's like to be both at the top of their careers, moving into great success. We see how that love is navigated. I think that's special to see a powerful and successful couple."

James, portrayed by **Dijon Means** in his youth, is a different story. "James is a man of quiet strength," shares Means. "He's been through some things in life, and he doesn't really know when to speak up at times. He gets his sense of strength and visibility from Odette."

Phifer elaborates, "James and Odette's relationship is an ideal relationship in the sense that they're the most solid relationship out of everybody in this story; James really supports Odette, especially in her times of struggle."

Barbara Jean's complicated love life features Ray and Lester. Ray, aka "Chick," portrayed by both Ryan Paynter and McMahon, is a poor, white boy who works at Earl's and captures Barbara Jean's heart. Lester, played by Cleveland Berto and Curtis Hall, loves Barbara Jean unconditionally. "Ray and Barbara Jean's relationship is complicated from the start. The main storyline is that me and her, we just see each other for people, and we see the hurt that each other has had," says Paynter. That doesn't mean everything is rose. McMahon adds, "There's a kind of destructive element to their relationship that kind of comes from the way they were raised as children and the environment that they're all in and all that kind of stuff has affected their connection so much so that they can't just get it together."

Lester and Barbara Jean's relationship is layered but authentic in its own right. Berto says Lester "sees a lot in Barbara Jean. He sees her tumultuous past, but he can also see her amazing future with him along with it."

Curtis Hall describes Lester as "a well-established person with money." But while he has many options, he really wants Barbara Jean, who he knows does not love him, but he believes she will one day. *The Supremes at Earl's All-You-Can-Eat* dials into that ongoing journey.

CAPTURING THE LOOK OF THE SUPREMES

Hair, makeup, and wardrobe are essential to storytelling, and The Supremes' story and Makeup Department Head **Andrea Jackson**, Makeup Department Head **Dionne Wynn**, and Costume Designer Whitney **Anne Adams** were keenly aware of this.

Adams describes working on the film as "a costumers' dream, having four different decades—to get to go from 1950 to 1968, to 1977, and to '99." Four very distinct times and places in the world. Wynn shares that she pulled inspiration from her mother and aunt to capture the look of Clarice and Barbara

Jean. Jackson was already happy to work on the film, and having her dear friend and collaborator Dionne there just made it better.

To pull the wardrobe together, Adams says, "I went on a rolling trip around the country, basically. I flew to LA, pulled a lot of rental house costumes to get a lot of our stock and then, I went deep into all the vintage stores in LA and New York, and then also locally in Wilmington."

As she fit the actors, Adams was sensitive to the role clothes play in building a character's personality. "A lot of it is through their clothes, how they wear their clothes, where they come from," she says. "All of that story that maybe the audience doesn't get to see but the actor feels and knows."

For inspiration, Wynn and Jackson admit to perusing *Ebony* and *Jet* for cues from the past. "In the '50s, women really didn't have a lot of money, but they really took care of themselves as far as roller setting their hair, teasing and curling it, and creating updos," is the example Jackson offers. At the same time, Wynn shares that "for women of color, there was not an array of makeups. So, they mostly used a lot of powders."

Wynn says Odette would only wear makeup going to church, so to her everyday look, they added nice highlights and warmth to show that she had love for her friends. "We wanted to see the love coming through that skin," she explains.

"Clarice would be more a posh woman," she continues, who shares that her own mother was very similar. Consequently, Clarice "would always be put together." Using her own aunt, who was a bit bolder for her time, as a template for Barbara Jean, whom she describes as a "natural beauty," Wynn wanted to see lashes on Barbara Jean and add those little details that say 'oh, wow, look at her: she's a knockout.'

THE HEARTBEAT OF THE SUPREMES

One consistent thread throughout their 30 year-long friendship of The Supremes is **Earl's Diner**. Reflecting on this, Mabry relates, "Earl's Diner had to live and breathe and fluctuate in a way that it provided a constant for our characters, so they never lose that connection. The women know they can go somewhere where they aren't supposed to be judged – that's the meaning of that building."

Earl's Diner is, ultimately, the space in which this tale flourishes as the women gather there to catch up on every boyfriend, teacher, job, and dream. "It's the heartbeat for these women and their sisterhood. We get to see the totality of their existence there," Aduba explains. "These women always know that no matter what is going on in their life, no matter where they are, they can always reach back into Earl's Diner as a place of joy."

Winters sums up the diner as only Big Earl himself could. "Earl's-All-You-Can-Eat is the heart of the community, and it's where the relationships that drive the narrative of the story are forged." He concludes, "The Supremes, through the force of their love for each other and the strength of their friendship, demonstrate to all of us that loving each other is the most important thing at the end of the day."

FILMMAKER BIOGRAPHIES

TINA MABRY (Director & Co-Writer)

A native of Tupelo, Mississippi, Tina Mabry graduated from the University of Southern California's School of Cinematic Arts with an MFA in Film Production. A true hyphenate, Mabry is an award-winning writer, director, and producer for television and film. She was a co-producer, writer, and director for USA's hit drama *Queen of the South*. Mabry was also a producer, writer, and director on OWN's *Queen Sugar* created by Ava DuVernay. Mabry's vast episodic directing credits include "Insecure" (HBO), "Dear White People" (Netflix), "Pose" (FX), "Grand Army" (Netflix), "Women of the Movement" (ABC), "Power" (STARZ), the "Beast Mode" pilot (Macro/TNT), and "The Politician" (Netflix).

Mabry began her career co-writing the feature screenplay *Itty Bitty Titty Committee* directed by Jamie Babbit. The film premiered at the Berlin International Film Festival in 2007 and won Best Feature Narrative at South by Southwest Film and Music Festival. Mabry went on to write and direct the groundbreaking feature film *Mississippi Damned*. While playing on the festival circuit, *Mississippi Damned* garnered an impressive thirteen awards from participation in fifteen film festivals including awards for Best Feature Film and Best Screenplay at the Chicago International Film Festival (2009). The film premiered on Showtime Networks in 2011.

Mabry's accolades include a DGA Award for Outstanding Directorial Achievement in Children's Programs and an NAACP Image Award for *Melody 1963: Love Has to Win* (Amazon). Out Magazine listed her as one of the most inspirational and outstanding people of the year (2009), Filmmaker Magazine named Mabry among the "25 New Faces of Independent Film," the Advocate magazine featured her in their list of "Top Forty Under 40", and with over 300 nominees and only 50 selected artists, United States Artists named Mabry the James Baldwin Fellow in Media (2010). In addition to winning the Creative Promise Award of Tribeca All Access, Mabry has participated in several talent development programs including the Fox Writers Intensive, Sundance's Screenwriters Intensive, and in a plethora of Film Independent's Artist Development programs (Project: Involve, Directors Lab, Writers Lab, Fast Track) where *Mississippi Damned* was awarded the Kodak Film Grant. She was also in the inaugural class for Women in Film's ReFrame Rise initiative (2019), highlighting her commitment to promoting diversity and inclusion in the industry.

MARTY BOWEN (Produced By)

Before founding Temple Hill Entertainment in 2006 with Wyck Godfrey, Marty was a partner and agent at United Talent Agency. He has since gone on to produce or executive produce some of the most popular entertainment of recent years, including films such as the *Twilight Saga*, *The Maze Runner* trilogy, *The Fault In Our Stars*, *First Man*, *Fatherhood*, *The Hate U Give*, *Love*, *Simon* and most recently, *Smile*. His television credits include "Dave," "The Outsider," "Revenge," and "Love, Victor."

WYCK GODFREY (Produced By)

Wyck Godfrey is a film and television producer who founded Temple Hill Entertainment with Marty Bowen in 2006. Together, they have produced a number of successful film franchises, notably *The Twilight Saga* and *The Maze Runner* trilogy, as well as *The Fault in Our Stars* and *First Man*. Godfrey was named President of Paramount Motion Picture Group in 2017, where he oversaw the production of films ranging from *Rocketman*, *A Quiet Place*, and *Top Gun: Maverick*. In 2020, Godfrey returned to producing with Temple Hill Entertainment, where he has since produced *Smile*, *Emergency*, and *On the Come Up*. Over his career, his films have grossed over 7 billion dollars in Worldwide box office.

ISAAC KLAUSNER (Produced By)

Isaac Klausner is the Head of Film at Temple Hill Entertainment, a film and television production company based in Los Angeles & London. Over the past sixteen years at the company, he has produced numerous films and shows across many different genres, ranging from the *Twilight* franchise, *The Fault in Our Stars*, to *First Man*.

Isaac's more recent projects include *Turtles All the Way Down, We Have a Ghost, Somebody I Used To Know, Smile, On the Come Up, Emergency, Happiest Season, Love, Victor,* and *Fatherhood.*

Originally from Washington, D.C., Isaac resides in Los Angeles with his wife and three children.

WHITNEY ANNE ADAMS (Costume Designer)

Whitney Anne Adams is a costume designer who has worked on internationally acclaimed films that have been featured at the Sundance, Cannes, Tribeca, and Toronto International Film Festivals. She is a member of both the United Scenic Artists Local 829 and the Costume Designers Guild Local 892 IATSE. Her films include *We Have A Ghost, Three Months, India Sweets and Spices, Freaky, Irreplaceable You* and *The Eyes of My Mother* as well as the independent film *Story Ave* which had its world premiere at 2023 SXSW. Adams is a passionate advocate for the art of costume design which helps define characters and serves as an essential part of storytelling.

Raised in Northern California, Adams spent her educational years and the beginning of her professional career working in all realms of theatrical costume design, dressing and tailoring. At UC San Diego, she studied under Tony Award-winning costume designer Judith Dolan while also working as a tailor and dresser at the La Jolla Playhouse.

After completing her degree, she moved to New York City, landing a job as a firsthand and tailor at Carelli Costumes where she worked for several years constructing couture garments for Broadway, film & TV, as well as concerts and private clients. Some of her favorite projects there include helping build all of Beyoncé's costumes for her 2009 *I Am Sasha Fierce* tour, working as Liza Minelli's personal seamstress on various outfits, and getting the chance to hone her fine embroidery and beading skills. During this time, she was also the personal seamstress to famed Oscar®-winning costume designer Eiko Ishioka. Working on Baz Lurhmann's *The Great Gatsby* as the costume design assistant to four-time Oscar®-winning costume designer, production designer, and producer Catherine Martin solidified her passion for her craft.

ROBIN URDANG (Music Supervisor)

Robin Urdang, owner of Reel Music SuperVision is a Music Supervisor for Film and TV. She has garnered 3 Emmy®'s for her work on "The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel," is a Grammy nominee, has won numerous Guild of Music Supervisor Awards, an HMMA award and received a Gold Album for her work on Luca Guadagnino's feature film, *Call Me by Your Name*.

Some of Robin's other projects include "Love & Death," the Oscar®-winning and nominated films, Nomadland, Beginners, "Rabbit Hole," Palm Springs, Bones and All, Suspiria, "Introducing Dorothy Dandridge," and Luca Guadagnino's latest film Challengers. Robin has collaborated with Luca for several years, currently finishing Queer and beginning work with him on After The Hunt. She also continues her long-time collaboration with Amy Sherman-Palladino and Dan Palladino on their newest series "Etoile." In addition, Robin is working on "Tracker" for CBS, "Cross" for Amazon, and On Swift Horses, an independent film starring Jacob Elordi and Daisy Edgar Jones.

Robin is a native New Yorker and currently resides in Los Angeles.

KATHRYN BOSTIC (Composer)

Kathryn Bostic is an award-winning composer, vocalist, and pianist known for her work on Broadway and across multiple media platforms, and for her critically acclaimed symphonic performances. In 2016, Bostic became the first African American female score composer in the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. Her scores and songs can be heard in productions of award-winning directors and writers. Bostic earned Emmy nominations for her scores in the films *Amy Tan: Unintended Memoir* and *Toni Morrison: The Pieces I Am*. For the Morrison documentary, she also wrote and performed the closing-title song, "High Above the Water," which was an Oscar-shortlisted song in 2020. At the Society of Composers & Lyricists' inaugural awards in January 2020, her score for this film was awarded "Outstanding Score for an Independent Film." Excerpts have been performed by the Los Angeles Philharmonic-Reel Change concert series.

Prominent organizations have taken note of Bostic's talents, earning her commissions from the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures, Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, and Bangor Symphony Orchestra, among others. The Chicago Sinfonietta chose her as their first artist-in-residence during the 2020–23 seasons. Her work has also been performed by orchestras nationwide. Bostic's collaboration with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra began in 2019 with the premiere of her piece, *The Great Migration: A Symphony in Celebration of August Wilson*, a tribute inspired by her work with the renowned playwright. Other PSO commissions include *Toni Morrison: The Pieces I Am (Cinematic Excerpts)*, based on her Emmynominated score, and *As I Please*, inspired by oral history projects with African American women from Pittsburgh's Hill District and curated with talent from the local artistic community.

Notable appearances of Bostic's music on Broadway include her collaboration with August Wilson on *Gem of the Ocean* and her music for *Bengal Tiger at the Baghdad Zoo*, which featured Robin Williams. She has also recorded and performed with many artists, including Nas, Ryuichi Sakamoto, and David Byrne, and has toured extensively to perform at festivals and venues worldwide. An advocate for music education, Bostic has been a guest artist at Tufts as well as at numerous colleges, universities, and cultural centers. Bostic has recently received an honorary Doctor of Music degree from her alma mater, Tufts University.

TARIQ ANWAR (Editor)

Having spent 18 years at the BBC, Tariq Anwar learnt his craft by cutting a huge array of programs; Music and Arts, Documentary Features, Light Entertainment, Drama Series and Serials, News, etc. He worked on extremely tight schedules, and the lessons he learnt in terms of storytelling, structure and how to make fast decisions were invaluable to his later work. Tariq has since cut a diverse selection of feature films, television dramas, and documentaries, and has won and been nominated for multiple awards. He won the European Editor Film award for his work on *The King's Speech*, for which he also received nominations for the Academy® Awards, BAFTA and ACE awards in 2011. Other recent feature film work includes *Farming*, *Human Capital*, *Worth*, *Ironbark*, *The Lady In The Van*, *Curve*, *Libertador*, *Great Expectations*, *Law Abiding Citizen*, *The Other Man*, *Revolutionary Road*, *The Good Shepherd*, *Stage Beauty and Sylvia*, as well as *American Beauty*, for which he was nominated for an Academy® Award, an ACE award and won BAFTA and GBFE award for Best Editor. Further BAFTA wins include the television dramas "Oppenheimer" and "Caught on a Train," and nominations include *The Madness Of King George*, "Summer's Lease," "Fortune's War," "The Monocled Mutineer," and "Tender is the Night." He recently received a Sophia Lifetime Achievement Award in Portugal and had a book – *Movers and Shakers the Monster Makers - An Irreverent Take on the Film Industry from an Editor's Perspective -* published.

Recent productions include *One Night in Miami* and *The Courier*. He is the father of actress, Gabrielle Anwar.

Kara Lindstrom's life in the art department began with work on *Nightmare on Elm Street*. From there, she went on to art direct the iconic *Heathers* and continued as a set decorator on such films as *Marshall* (directed by Reginald Hudlin), *French Kiss* (directed by Lawrence Kasden), *Strange Days* (directed by Kathryn Bigelow), *In the Line of Fire* (starring Clint Eastwood), and the mini-series "Drug Wars" (produced by Michael Mann).
